**WARM UP:** Have you ever formed an opinion about someone that you later came to realize was wrong? What did you do about it?

We often form opinions about people way too quickly and find it difficult to admit that we were wrong even when the facts prove us so for one reason... Pride. Rather than admitting our error and apologizing or changing our opinion, we stubbornly try to justify our actions and end up

- 4. How do the Pharisees respond when they learn about this healing? What do they accuse Jesus of?
- 5. How illogical was their argument? If you are in a war, would you attack your own forces and defeat them? Why not?
- 6. If Jesus cast out demons from a man who was possessed, what was it a sign and proof of?
- 7. Is it possible for anyone to be neutral about Jesus? If this is true, why do people try to ride the fence concerning Jesus' identity?
