Parable of the Soils

When it comes to growing things, you may have a "green thumb" and grow whatever you want or even artificial houseplants tremble when they hear you coming. I am not sure about you, but some people seem to

be able to grow anything and everything. They even have an amazing ability to bring seemingly dead plants back to life when anyone else would have just tossed them out. Others seem to kill everything they touch no matter how hard they try. Some don't even try.

If there is one thing I've learned when it comes to growing things, it is this. A successful harvest depends more on the condition of the soil than it does anything else. These "parables" hid the truth from those who had their minds made up, having already chosen to reject Jesus. Those who truly wanted to know Jesus and listened carefully would understand his words.
