WK 54 The Gospel of Matthew

WARM UP: Judgment delayed is judgment denied. Do you agree or disagree with the previous statement? Why or why not?

Background: There's a judgment day, someday. Perhaps we've been lulled into a sense of false security or outrage when we see those who

are obviously guilty of committing crimes seemingly never punished or never have to face the consequences of their actions. We would have to admit that it seems to be more and more common in our time, so we wonder, "When will their payday come?"

It's a good question that Jesus' own disciples seemed to have been struggling with when Jesus told his parable of the wheat and the weeds. How could a Holy and a Righteous God allow justice to be delayed? It doesn't seem fair, and it doesn't seem to be right, but we aren't seeing the entire picture. Jesus explains that just because the administration of justice is delayed doesn't mean that justice is denied. There will be a payday, someday. God may not settle all of his accounts in October or in April, but He does and will settle them in the time of His own choosing.
